



Setting parental restrictions on your child's kit






Protecting themselves

- Most people mean Fortnite Battle Royale, which is free
- •100 players; aim is to be the last one standing
- ·No blood or gore "killed" players disappear
- Isn't this basically paintballing, without the exercise or the laundry bill?
- Didn't we play "bang bang you're dead" at their age?
- Considerable pressure to make in-app purchases
- Parents: set the general restrictions on their devices


Protecting themselves

Try not to demonise a particular game or app.

- Emphasise behaviour for staying safer
 - Setting parental controls
 - Adequate supervision when communicating online
 - Knowing what to do if they get that "uh oh" feeling
