Our vision

At St Luke's we believe Geography inspires children to have a curiosity and fascination about the world around them and its people. In itself Geography forms an important part of the curriculum but it can also be integrated through other curriculum subjects to achieve pupils maximum potential.

Why do we teach Geography?

As a multicultural school we feel it is important to make children aware of the different cultures and traditions of those around them as well as different people's experiences of life in order to promote compassion and tolerance. Geography also allows children to learn how to become respectful citizens and be proactive in helping the green initiative and understanding of humans' impact on our planet.

What learning opportunities are there?

At St Luke's we offer many opportunities for the children to experience the world around them, from local visits to Key Stage 2 residential field trips, where they can explore new environments and encounter new experiences. The children visit the local library which offers a range of information books and practical materials such as maps and atlases to consolidate their learning.
