Children have access to music through topic-based activities and weekly music lessons taught by a teacher with music specialism.

Extra-curricular opportunities (piano, guitar and ukulele), are provided by peripatetic teachers from the Kingston Music Service. A thriving KS2 choir meets regularly, with wider performance opportunities with other schools and in the local community taking place. Our highly acclaimed EYFS / KS1 Nativity, and KS2 Productions are the highlight of the school year, with children joining together to showcase their musical talent.
